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#### 4. Pakistan-Africa Bilateral Trade

#### 4.1. Bilateral Trade in Goods

#### 4.1.1. Bilateral Trade Balance

Trade balance of Pakistan has been favourable during 2010-15, however, after 2015, the trade balance is becoming adverse and widening. In addition to the adverse trade balance, the volume of bilateral trade remained low. Currently, the volume of bilateral trade between Pakistan and Africa stands at US \$ 3.69 million. Exports are amounted to US \$ 1.44, Pakistan's imports from Africa remains US \$ 2.25 billion during 2017. Trade balance between Pakistan and Africa is depicted as follows.




Figure 4. 1. Pakistan's Trade Balance with Africa

As revealed above, Pakistan's exports to Africa indicate an increasing trend on the average during 2003-2017. However, increase in exports to Africa is not appreciable. Bilateral trade between Pakistan and Africa is also reflected in the following Table.

At present, Pakistan has not been able to realize its full potential despite being enjoying cordial relations with the African countries. All African countries are currently dominant by China and India due to aggressive marketing and continuous presence in this continent. The volume of exports to Africa by China and India stood at around US\$ 90 billion and US\$ 30 billion respectively. The goods pharmaceutical products, cereals, textile, machinery and leather goods are the main exports of China and India to Africa. Pakistan has also a competitive advantage in these commodities and by exploring the African markets Pakistan can maximize the benefits of exports and minimize the risk of exports uncertainty. At present, Pakistan is mainly exporting cereals, cotton, textile products, sugar and paper products to Africa and importing tea, coffee, crude oil, iron, steel, inorganic chemicals, cotton and textile products from African region.

Africa is rich in natural and mineral resources and is called world's storehouse of strategic raw materials. Lack of information, mutual understandings, business interactions, connectivity and people to people contact between Pakistan and African countries are the ground of the low economic relations.

Pakistan's poor diversification of exports is also evident from the low but sustained share of Pakistan's bilateral trade with Africa, as depicted by the following Figure.




Figure 4. 2. Bilateral Trade with as Percentage of Pakistan's Global Trade

### 4.1.2. Pakistan's Top Exports Destinations Economies in Africa.

Pakistan's top exports destination in Africa include, Kenya, South Africa, Madagascar, Tanzania, Egypt and Nigeria etc. The detail of Pakistan's top Exports destination economies with Pakistan's exports trend in Africa is depicted as follows.




Figure 4. 3. Pakistan's Exports Trend to top Destinations in Africa (US \$ Million)

As evident, Kenya is Pakistan's largest export destination, followed by South Africa and then Egypt. It is also indicated that Pakistan's exports to most of its top exports destination in the African Continent is increasing over time, which indicates that Africa's top economies are becoming attractive for Pakistani exports. Additionally, Pakistan also exhibits an increasing trend of exports to most of the exports destined economies in Africa.

### 4.1.3. Pakistan's Import Origin Economies in Africa

Pakistan's top import source economy in the Africa region is South Africa – Pakistan's imports from South Africa amounts to US \$ 1.04 billion during 2017. The other top import source economies of Pakistan in Africa include Kenya, Morocco and the Egypt. Detail of Pakistan's top imports source economies in the African continent are depicted in Figure 4.4 below.




Figure 4. 4. Pakistan's Imports Trend from Top Source – African Economies (US \$ Million)

# 4.2. Bilateral Trade in Services

# 4.2.1. Pakistan's Services Exports to Africa by Types

Pakistan also has services trade relations with various economies of the Africa region. Pakistan's largest services exports to Africa is Government goods and services n.i.e. – contributing 66 % to total services exports to Africa, followed by 'other business services', which contributes 15 % to

total services exports to Africa. Pakistan's other services exports to Africa, include 'transportation' – which contributes 14 % to total services exports, telecommunication, computer and information services, which contribute 5 % to total services exports to Africa and travel services – which contribute 1 % to total services exports to Africa. Pakistan's services exports to Africa by types are depicted below.

#### 4.2.2. Pakistan's Services Exports to Africa by Destination

Pakistan's largest destination of services exports in Africa is Swaziland. Its share in Pakistan's services exports to Africa is 26 % (US \$ 17.3 million). Around 97 % of services exports are made-up of government good and services. Other services exports to Swaziland include 'other business services' (US \$ 0.41 million). Libya is the second largest services exports destination of Pakistan. Pakistan's services exports to Libya stands at US \$ 11.24 million (16.8% of total services exports to Africa). Like Swaziland, more than 97 % of services exports to Libya are made-up of 'government goods and services' (11 million US \$). Mauritius is Pakistan's third largest services exports destination – contributing 16.2 % to total Pakistan's services exports to Africa (US \$ 10.86 million). Pakistan's largest services exports sector to Mauritius is transportation – contributing 52

% to total services exports to Mauritius (US \$ 5.6 million). Pakistan's second top services exports sector to Mauritius is business services, which contribute 30 % to total services exports to Mauritius (2016-17). Detail of Pakistan's services exports destination is given as follows.

#### 4.2.3. Services Export Potential to Africa

Like potential of trade in goods, Pakistan also has high potential in services exports to Africa. Top services exports potential to Africa is the government services exports – government embassy and consulate, government military units and agencies and other goods and services. The next largest

services export sector with potential exports to Africa is 'other business services' consisted of research and development (R&D), professional and management consulting services and technical and trade related and other services. Pakistan's services export potentials to Africa is depicted as follows.
